ACTIVITIES PERFORMED IN THE YEAR: July 01, 2020- June 30, 2021

Financial Year July 01, 2020— June 30, 2021 will be considered as a Mile-Stone of the development of our organization specially for partnership with Communication with Community (CwC) Working Group, Creative Pathway / BRAC, CoonectHER USA, Danish ChurchAid-DCA, Successful implementation of VGD Project, Extension of Partnership with Bangladesh NGO Foundation for rehabilitation of 15 Sex Workers, successful implementation of Humanitarian Response Program. However, we performed following activities in the reported period without having any exterior support:

- 1. Child Rights and Education: PARC implemented 02 Child Rights Program Supported by Save the Children Australia, 25 NFPE Centre covering 750 learners supported by BRAC and 07 Preschool—PROTHEVA supported by Save the Children USA and continued on one fund) covering 140 learners. During the reporting year the organization could not get the opportunity to implement any project for having no financial support. But, under its Bhasanchar Response Program it facilitates 08 Child Club covering 195 Children (Boys 111, Girls 84) to promote Child Rights in line with UNCRC.
- 2. Sex Workers Rights and Rehabilitation: Achievements of PARC under this program:
 - a. Days Observation: Observation of International Day to End Violence Against Sex Workers and International Sex Workers Rights Day: PARC has successfully been observing the International Day to End Violence Against Sex Workers and International Sex Workers Day since 2006 and 2006 respectively. But, this year the origination observed the day indoor due considering COVID 19 Pandemic Situation. As part of observing International Day to End Violence Against Sex Workers, it arranged a Discussion Meeting in its Head Office on 3 December 2020 and arranged 5 Court Yard Meeting covering 65 Sex Workers. Similarly, the organization observed International Sex Workers Rights Day on 3rd March 2021.
 - b. COVID Reponses Support: During the year, with the support of Sheba Serve People, 55 numbers of Sex Workers were given 3 meals of cooked food while 23 sex workers were given foods for days. The program was inaugurated by Chief Guest Professor Columnist Rezaul Karim Mohammad Tareque while Engineer JotirmoyDhar of Youth Red Crescent Society attend as Special Guest.



c. Rehabilitation of Sex Workers: During the period, the organization awarded 8th



installment of grants for the program **Rehabilitation of Sex Workers**. It is recognition of successful completion of 7th installment. With the grant, it provided 15 Days training on Stone Work and Show Making to 10 Sex Workers. The training was inaugurated by the Chief Guest Mr. ANM Sawrav Alam, Principal, Omar Gani MES University College and Special Guest Mr. Md. Mohiuddin (Badal) a

renowned Businessman and Ex Sports Secretary of Chittagong University Student Union . In addition to this 05 SexWorkers were given 10 Days training on Cane and Bamboo Work. This training was ended with a Closing ceremony and Production





Materials Distribution Program.Prominent Journalist Leader M. Nasirul Hoque attended the Chief Guest. The trained Sex Workers are now rehabilitated in as a producer involving in producing hand made products.

15 Sex Workers were given Production Materials. Now they has been producing handmade products and become entrepreneurs and enjoying dignified life getting market Support from PARC.

3. Disabled Rights and Rehabilitation

Disable Rights and Development: this is one of the core programs of the NGO. **It implemented 02 project in partnership with Disability Rights Fund (DRF) USA and 3 projects in Partnership with** Canter for Disability in Development (CDD). The last project supported by CDD /EU/ Light for the World was **SCANNED Project. The organization has successfully implemented the planned activities and now continuing the project mobilizing local resources.** Activities performed under the project during the year are:

- 1. Conducted 134 Awareness Raising Contact, 79 in Cox'sBazar, 55 in Chittagong numbers on Prevention of disability and Disability in Emergency during pregnancy covering 129 persons out of which 53 are Female and 81 were male.

a. Vulnerable Group Development Program:

PARC has been implementing **Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) Program** since July 2013. The program brings the opportunity for PARC to work all Upazila (7 out of) except Ramgar with to total. It has created opportunity to build report with District Administration of Khagrachari District, Upazila Administration of Khagrachari Sadar and Manikchari Upazila, District and Upazila Office of Directorate of Women Affaires and concerned UP Chairman and members. It also brought an opportunity to work in partnership of Upazila AgricultureExtension Office and Livestock office that imparted hands-on training to the targeted VGD Members. During the cycle PARC mobilized 1, 13, 10,600 BDT of saving from the members. Its savings collection rate was 100%. During the year, the organizations provided various trainings to 2693 numbers of various vulnerable group members mostly of ethnic community. Attendance of the training was overwhelming. Respective UNOs, District and Upazila Officers of Directorate of Women Affaires visited our training program and expressed his deep satisfaction that encouraged our facilitators a lot.

Professor Laila Khaleda, Executive Council Member of PARC, Mr. Ismail Mintu, Coordinator, PARC, Ex Rotaractor Syed Mahmud Zami attended the inaugural ceremony where Chief Guest Mr. Tareque said, most of the peoples of our country passing a vulnerable and inhuman life suffering from severe economic and psychological crisis due to prolonged Lockdown imposed by the government to combat Corona Virus.

So, the riches of our society should come forward to protect these COVID 19 affected helpless poor as part of their social responsibilities. He added, Infection of Corona Virus and numbers of infected and death persons have alarmingly being increased for mere our negligence to practices health protocol particularly to maintain social distance. So, he urged for more aware and responsible behaviour from all of our society. Otherwise, once the situation goes beyond our control, none of us would not be safe from the deadly cruel attack of the virus.

- The camp needs more community engagement initiative particularly on Fire and Disability.

Distribution Program: At the end of the Event, there was a Distribution program of Complementary Materials to Fire Affected Mosques of Camp 8 East. The program was

inaugurated by Md in Charge of camp 8 East Secretary attached to the Relief & Repartition numbers of mosques massive fire incident of with another one (not fire needs) totaling 09



the materials for the use of their Musalli (practitioner). The Chief Gust along with others handed over the materials through Imams or Representatives from the mosques concerned.

The materials include 900 running feet (3600 SFT) of Plastic made Jaynamaj Roll (Prayer mat), 14 quality single Jaynamaj for Imams (Religious Leaders), 120 pieces of Water Pot (Badna) for Wadu, 120 pieces of Caps, 105 Numbers of Holy Qur'an, Tasbih (Counter for Praising God) and Oajifa (Booklet of selected pieces of Quran).

The Distribution program was inaugurated by Mr.Marma, Camp in Charge of camp 8 West and Assistant Secretary, at the end of theawareness raising event. Total 21 Radio out of 50 were distributed. Remaining 29 were distributed on June 29 2021.
