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CEO's Forward

Dear Friends, Partners, Donors, and Supporters,

It is my great pleasure to present the Annual Report 2024–2025 of the Rehabilitation Centre for Prostitutes and Rootless Children (PARC).

Since its establishment in 1994, PARC has been working to improve the socio-economic status of street sex workers, street children, and other vulnerable sections of society. Our mission is to improve the socio-economic potential of urban prostitutes, street children, and other marginalized groups through training, rehabilitation, and their active participation in development processes. Guided by the principles of humanity, inclusion, social justice, and accountability, we continue to work towards creating opportunities and restoring dignity for those most in need.

During the reporting year, PARC achieved significant progress in both humanitarian and development programming. Under the project “Support to FDMN in Bhasanchar in Education Sector,” implemented with funding support from Global Affairs Canada (GAC) through BRAC, PARC successfully completed the first phase of the project and commenced a new phase following its extension. As part of the education sector restructuring in Bhasanchar, PARC assumed responsibility for additional education clusters and expanded formal education services. At present, PARC is providing education services in eight clusters, reaching 1,777 learners, including 35 children with disabilities. The inauguration of the formal education program in Cluster 113 by the Additional Relief and Repatriation Commissioner, in the presence of representatives from UNICEF, BRAC, and partner organizations, was a proud milestone for our organization.

The project evaluation conducted under the BRAC Pool Fund recognized PARC as one of the leading partners in service delivery and data quality. At the same time, the evaluation identified areas where further improvements are required. We have taken these findings seriously and initiated necessary measures to strengthen organizational capacity, financial management, monitoring, and accountability to ensure greater effectiveness and sustainability in our future interventions.

PARC also continued implementing the Vulnerable Women Benefit (VWB) Program in partnership with the Department of Women Affairs. During the reporting period, 2,685 women beneficiaries in Patiya and Mirsharai Upazilas successfully completed the program cycle and received their savings along with accrued benefits. Proposals for the next cycle have already been submitted to continue supporting vulnerable women and promoting their economic empowerment.

Beyond project achievements, PARC continued to strengthen teacher capacity, community engagement, disability inclusion, child protection, and Protection from Sexual Exploitation, Abuse and Harassment (PSEAH) mechanisms. These initiatives have contributed to safer, more inclusive, and more accountable services for the communities we serve.

This year was also significant for the organization as a new Executive Committee was elected to provide strategic leadership and governance for the coming term. I congratulate the newly elected members and sincerely thank the outgoing committee for their dedication, guidance, and valuable contribution to the growth and sustainability of PARC.

On behalf of PARC, I express my heartfelt gratitude to our staff, volunteers, Executive Committee members, government authorities, development partners, donors, and community stakeholders for their continued trust and support.

Together, we are creating positive change and building hope for vulnerable communities.

As we move forward, PARC remains committed to its vision and mission and to serving those who need us most. We look to the future with confidence, determination, and a renewed commitment to building a more inclusive, equitable, and dignified society for all.

Organisation Profile

Background of PARC

Rehabilitation Centre for Prostitutes And Rootless Children (PARC) was established in September 1994 as the expression of social and moral commitment of its founder. The commitment is grown the feelings at the painful murder of a minor girl –**Shob-Meher** in a brothel of Bangladesh.

PARC has been working with a crucial problem of women and children issue which has not yet been addressed effectively by any Government and non-government organizations, especially in Chittagong city of Bangladesh. PARC is trying to provide rehabilitation support and services of self-help improvement and the socio-economic upliftment of various vulnerable sections of our society like poor, distressed Sex Workers and street children to lead a life of human dignity and to let them free them from poverty and injustice.

Initially activities of PARC were focused to services and centralized to provide health and EPI services and awareness rising on HIV/AIDS/STD. While working with and for sex workers we found that lacks of services are not the one and only problem of sex workers. Services are available in Chittagong. But sex workers are being deprived of it due to social discrimination. Meantime chief executive of PARC has got an opportunity to attend global conference of sex workers known as Millennium **Milan Mela** held on March 03-05, 2001 in Calcutta , India that has change the strategy of its' (PARC) intervention and it initiates right based interventions aside its service-oriented activities. After the conference, it prepared for one year to initiate its right based interventions for sex workers rights and publicly initiated the intervention on 3rd March 2003 through observing as **International Day for the Rights of Sex Workers** with the assistance of Chittagong Local Initiatives Foundation (CLIF) and Chittagong social development Forum (CSDF) which was covered almost all of national and local dailies; as one of the committed Non-profits of the Day involved in the Declaration of the Day. Similarly, the organizations attend 3rd **International Day to End Violence on Sex Workers** in California as Paper Presenter and introduced the observation of the day in Bangladesh. Also, the organization is the pioneer of involving sex workers of Chittagong in alternative option of income followed by 15 Days training on **Nakshi-Katha** (an Indigenous Handicraft) and 7 days training on Entrepreneurship. It has started its humanitarian response in Cox's Bazar in 2019 and in in **Bhasanchar** of Hatiya, Noakhali District in 2021 where it has been addressing the issue of Education, Protection, Livelihood, Disability .

A 09-member Executive Body comprising with peoples established in different professionals with high educational and technical background is the governing body of the organization. It seats in bi- monthly and takes major decisions and implements organizational policies through a group of paid staff and volunteers. EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (ECE)

Support to FDMN in Bhasanchar – Education Sector

Under the project “**Support to FDMN in Bhasanchar in Education Sector**”, implemented by PARC with funding support from **Global Affairs Canada (GAC)** and the **Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT)**, and managed through the **BRAC Pooled Fund**, significant progress was achieved in early childhood education (ECE) for forcibly displaced Myanmar nationals (FDMN) living on Bhasanchar Island.

The ECE interventions targeted **two key age groups – 3 years and 4 years** – to ensure **play-based learning** and the **foundational development** of young learners. The program focused on fostering **physical, cognitive, language, social, and emotional development** through structured play-based education.

During the reporting period, a total of **1,699 learners** (Girls: **857**, Boys: **842**) participated in ECE interventions across **12 classes** located in **Shelter 24, 26, 06, 08, 49, 113, 81, and 83**. This included **04 girls and 03 boys with disabilities**, ensuring inclusive access to early childhood education for all learners.

Impact: The ECE interventions in Bhasanchar have created a safe, stimulating and inclusive learning environment where young children develop the essential skills needed for successful transition to primary education. Teachers reported improved attendance and active participation among both girls and boys, including children with disabilities. Parents also became more engaged in their children’s early learning through regular meetings and awareness sessions. As a result, the program is strengthening school readiness, social cohesion, and the overall well-being of FDMN children on the island.





MYANMAR CURRICULUM (MC)

Expanding Access to Quality Education on Bhasanchar Island

Under the project “Support to FDMN in Bhasanchar in Education Sector”, implemented by PARC with funding support from Global Affairs Canada (GAC) and the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) and managed through the BRAC Pooled Fund, PARC continued to expand access to inclusive and quality education for the forcibly displaced Myanmar nationals (FDMN) living on Bhasanchar Island.



Building on its early childhood education (ECE) interventions, PARC initiated the rollout of the Myanmar Curriculum at both primary and secondary levels to ensure that children can learn in a familiar language and context and progress seamlessly through the education system. This curriculum is now offered in the following

shelters: 24, 26, 06, 08, 49, 113, 81, and 83.

The program covers all key stages of formal schooling:

Lower Primary (KG to Grade 2), Upper Primary (Grade 3 to Grade 5), Secondary (Grade 6 to Grade 8).

During the reporting period, a total of 1048 learners (Girls: 525, Boys: 523) were enrolled across these grade levels. This includes 03 girls and 2 boys with disabilities, ensuring that children with special needs are able to participate fully in education alongside their peers.

Impact: The introduction of the Myanmar Curriculum has strengthened continuity and quality of learning for FDMN children by aligning with the education they received in their home country. Teachers report greater learner engagement and improved attendance, while parents express increased confidence in the relevance of schooling for their children’s future. The inclusive approach—covering both children with and without disabilities—has also fostered greater social integration and equal learning opportunities in the classroom.

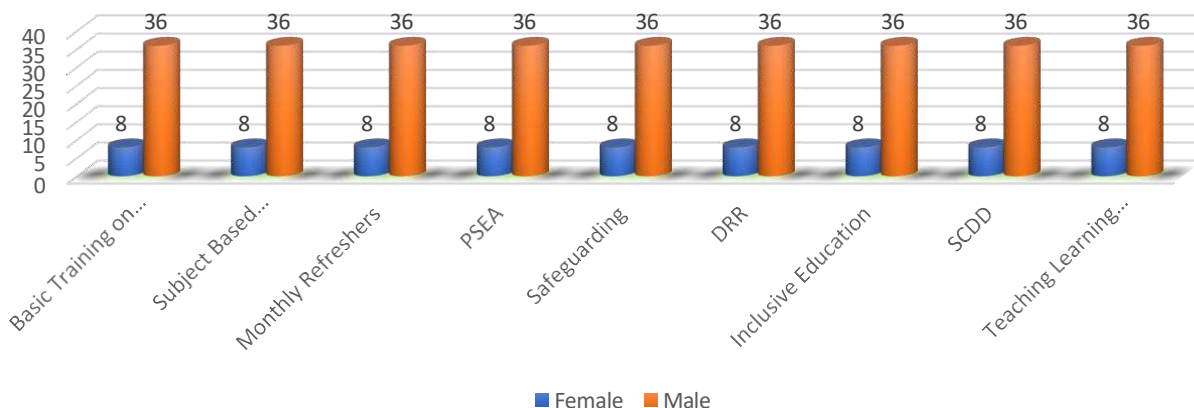


TRAINING AND CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT

To ensure quality teaching and stronger classroom support for children, PARC organized a comprehensive range of professional development initiatives for teachers and staff throughout the reporting period. These included basic training on pedagogy, subject-based pedagogy, and regular monthly refresher trainings to reinforce good practices. In addition, staff and teachers received capacity building on key cross-cutting issues such as Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA), Child Safeguarding, Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR), Inclusive Education, and Psychosocial First Aid (PFA). PARC also facilitated Teacher Learning Circles (TLC), Study Circles, Staff Capacity Development Days (SCDD), and sessions on Emergency Preparedness Planning. Together, these

activities strengthened teachers' and staff members' knowledge, skills, and confidence, resulting in improved classroom delivery, enhanced child protection, and better preparedness to respond to emergencies.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Recognizing that quality education is strengthened by active community and parental involvement, PARC placed significant emphasis on **parent and community engagement** alongside classroom teaching during the reporting period.

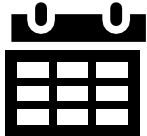
To improve **learner attendance, retention, and home-based support**, PARC organized regular **parent meetings** with the parents of both Early Childhood Education (ECE) and Myanmar Curriculum students. These meetings provided parents with guidance on how to support their children's learning at home—particularly in **literacy and numeracy, child protection, and children's safety and well-being**—thereby creating a stronger learning environment beyond the classroom. In total, **462 female** and **578 male** parents participated in these sessions during the reporting period. Parents reported a better understanding of how to help their children with schoolwork, maintain regular attendance, and ensure a safe and supportive home environment.



In addition, PARC established and supported **School Management Committees (SMCs)** in each school. These committees bring together parents, community leaders, and school representatives to strengthen accountability and improve the quality of education. Through regular meetings, SMCs worked closely with PARC staff to identify gaps in school facilities, teaching-learning processes, and teacher support needs, and to raise

these issues with PARC management for timely action. This collaborative approach has enhanced **transparency, community ownership, and the overall quality of Myanmar Curriculum education** on Bhasanchar Island.

As a result of these efforts, parental engagement and community oversight have directly contributed to improved learner attendance, greater trust in the education program, and more responsive support to both teachers and students—key elements for sustaining and improving quality education in this context.



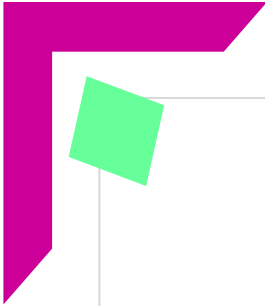
INTERNATIONAL DAY CELEBRATION

During the reporting period, PARC organized and celebrated several **international days** to promote learning, awareness, and community engagement. Key events included the **16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence**, where awareness sessions and community activities were conducted to sensitize learners, teachers, and parents on gender equality, protection, and women's rights, and **International Literacy Day**, which featured activities to encourage reading, literacy, and lifelong learning among children and community members. These celebrations not only enhanced knowledge and awareness on important social issues but also fostered **active learner participation, parental involvement, and a supportive learning environment**, thereby contributing to the overall quality and inclusiveness of education on Bhasanchar Island.

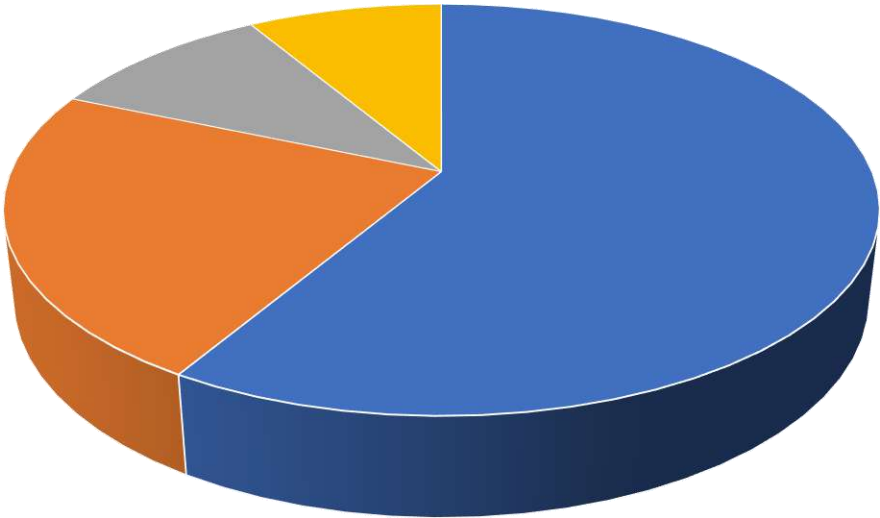


COMMUNITY AWARENESS AND PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITY

During the reporting period, PARC conducted a range of community awareness and promotional activities to strengthen public health knowledge and preventive practices among residents of Bhasanchar Island. Key initiatives included awareness sessions on Dengue, Chikungunya, and seasonal diseases, aimed at informing the community about symptoms, prevention, and timely treatment. In addition, PARC distributed posters, leaflets, and other informational materials to reinforce these messages and ensure broader community reach. These activities helped enhance community understanding of health risks, promote preventive behaviors, and contribute to the overall well-being of children and families on the island.

Chapter 03

Vulnerable Women Benefits Program

PARC has been implementing **Vulnerable Women Benefits Program** previously known as **Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) Program** since July 2013. The program brings the opportunity for PARC to work all Upazila (7 out of) except Ramgar totaling 06 Upazila . During the reported financial year, we implemented the project in Patiya and Mirsharai Upazila of Chattogram. It created opportunity to build report with District Administration of Khagrachari District, different Upazila Administration of Khagrachari and Chattogram District and Upazila Office of Directorate of Women Affaires and concerned UP Chairman and members (until its devolution by Interim Government). It also brought an opportunity to work in partnership of Upazila Agriculture Extension Office and Livestock office that imparted hands-on training to the targeted VGD Members. During the periods of partnership, PARC refunded mobilized 95,65,200 BDT of savings collected from the members. Its savings collection rate till January December 2024 was 100%. But during the period, savings mobilization was stopped by Government. During the periods, the organizations provided various trainings to 2685 numbers of various vulnerable group members mostly of ethnic community. Attendance of the training was overwhelming. Respective Upazila Officers of Directorate of Women Affaires visited our training program and expressed his deep satisfaction that encouraged our facilitators a lot.

01. Post Flood Rehabilitation

Post Flood Rehabilitation : It's an emergency response program. Aim of the project is provide post flood rehabilitation support to flood affected people of Isakhali Union of Mirsharai Upazila of Chattogram District.

Key Activities of the Project:

Goat Distribution : With the fund from Bangladesh NGO Foundation, based on a survey , a total of 34 Black Bengal goats (2 goats per family) were provided to the heads of 17 flood-affected families in Mirsharai Upazila of Chattogram District.

Chicken Distribute : Similarly, based on a survey a total of 100 local chickens (5 chickens per family) were being distributed among the heads of 20 flood-affected families in Mirsharai Upazila of Chattogram District.

Free medicine and vaccination : All livestock (34 goats & 100 chicken) were administered free medicines and vaccinated.

Livestock Training : A one-day training on goat and chicken rearing was provided along with the distribution of livestock. The training program was conducted by Mirsharai Upazila Livestock Officer Dr. Jakirul Farid . The distribution program was held on 10 November 2024 chaired by Upakul SUS president retired Additional Secretary Md Nurul Alam Nizam. Mr. Bhuvan Chandra Biswas , BNF Management Bord Member retired Additional Secretary attended as Chief Guest of the program while special guests were social workers and development leaders Mr. Kamal Uddin, MD, Baraiar Hat General Hospital, Mr Morshed Chowdhury, Director, YPSA, Md Jobair Faruque Litan, Executive Director, Upakul SUS, Ms. Momena Akther Nayan, Chairman, Samata Mohila Somaj Unnayan Sangstha.

Impact :

The project contributed to poverty reduction through improving the socio-economic condition of the beneficiaries.

The heads of 17 flood-affected and poor families were trained on goat rearing and develop their skills in goat farming.

20 female members from 20 flood-affected and poor families received training on local chicken rearing and developed their skills in poultry farming.

All the 37 individuals from 37 families have been utilizing their acquired training skills and take initiatives to become entrepreneurs. They started recovering their losses caused by the flood through reproductions of their life-stocks. They are now engaged in self-employment by utilizing the training and livelihood support materials, which helped them recover from flood-related losses. Through goat and chicken rearing, they are gaining opportunities for sustainable income generation and meet their family needs. Thus, The project has been contributing to poverty reduction by improving the socio-economic conditions of the beneficiaries. Goat Distribution : With the fund from Bangladesh NGO Foundation, based on a survey , a total of 30 Black Bengal goats (2 goats per family) were provided to 15 poor disadvantaged women in Yasin Nagar Village of Haladiya Union of Raozan Upazila of Chattogram District.

Free medicine and vaccination : All livestock (30 goats) were administered free medicines and vaccinated.

Livestock Training : A half-day training on goat and livestock rearing was provided along with the distribution of Goats. The training program was conducted by Raozan Upazila Veterinary Field Assistant Mr. Twinkle Sutradhar . The distribution program was held on 28 April 2025 in Ruhul Amin Master Bari, Raozan chaired by Md. Nazrul Islam Manna, Chief Executive , PARC. Dr. Joyita Basu, Raozan Upazila Livestock Officer . Special guests were Mr. Md. Belal Uddin, President, Raozan Press Club, Master Md. Farid , Teacher, Yasin Nagar Jubilee Primary School, Mr. Musleh Uddin, Social and Mr. Nasimul Hoque Chowdhury.

Impact : The project contributed to inclusion of 15 poor distressed women of 15 families in Income Generating Activities and thereby to poverty reduction through skill development training on Goat Rearing & livestock reproduction ,improving the socio-economic condition of the beneficiaries.

The 15 poor destitute women were trained on goat rearing and develop their skills in goat farming. All the 15 participants have been utilizing their acquired training skills and take initiatives to become entrepreneurs. They are now engaged in self-employment by utilizing the training and livelihood support materials, which has started helping them poverty reduction Through goats rearing, they are gaining opportunities for sustainable income generation and meet their family needs. Thus, The project has been contributing to poverty reduction by improving the socio-economic conditions of the beneficiaries. 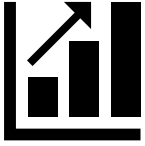
1. Disabled Rights and Rehabilitation

Disable Rights and Development: this is one of the core programs of the NGO. It implemented 02 project in partnership with Disability Rights Fund (DRF) USA and 3 projects in Partnership with Canter for Disability in Development (CDD). The last project supported by CDD /EU/ Light for the World was **SCANNED Project**. The organization has successfully implemented the planned activities and now continuing the project mobilizing local resources. Activities performed under the project during the year are:

1. Conducted 252 Awareness Raising Contact, 185 in Bhasanchar & 67 in Chattogram numbers on Prevention of disability and Disability in Emergency , during pregnancy covering 252 persons out of which 133 are Female and 119 were male.

The community now chooses these trusted local actors to support survivors during investigations, ensuring survivors' wishes are respected.
